- 14. The presidential election that served as the first major test in using primaries was in the year 1912 .
- (This was the election between Woodrow Wilson, Theodore Roosevelt, and Howard Taft Woodrow Wilson won the election).
- -Theodore and Taft split the Republican vote thus allowing Wilson to step in and win the majority.
- 11. Tor F In New Hampshire, it is written law that the Secretary of State is required to schedule their primary at least one week before a similar event.
- 10. Tor F In Iowa, 17-year olds can vote in the state's caucus, if they turn 18 before the general election.
- 17. **Mitt Romney** won both the Iowa caucus and New Hampshire primary in 2012; this is significant because he was the first to win both states since the year 1976.
